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Preface

Founded in Mainz by Bernhard Schott in 1770, Schott music publishers are celebrating 250 years in business in 2020. To mark this important anniversary we have chosen the motto 'Joy of Music': this commemorates the publication by Schott in 1826 of the first edition of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony, one of the most significant works in musical history, with its celebrated final chorus of Schiller's 'Ode to Joy' and the hope that 'All men shall become brothers'. Our motto also conveys our belief that music can bring joy into the lives of individuals and enrich the human society.

To mark the occasion of this anniversary, Schott publishers and editorial colleagues have searched and revised some historic treasures from the publisher's archives. The title of this new collection is intended for professional musicians, proficient amateurs and students who wish to discover interesting material beyond the standard repertoire. This volume contains a selection from the Romantic era: virtuoso encore pieces, showpieces, concert pieces, original compositions and skillful arrangements of well-known melodies from the 18th and 19th centuries. The original compositions and arrangements are by influential virtuoso composers and are often considered of their instrument.

This 'Joy of Music' project has motivated us to search through the Schott archives and rummage through ten thousand scores to find about 1700 pieces. We have carefully and eventually choose a representative selection of 12 compositions for this volume. In addition, besides a few original works we mainly found arrangements of famous concert pieces. These are presented in fantasies, variations, medleys and other forms. Some are intended for concert music that may have been played at salons, but some are more suitable for the parlour or as virtuoso showpieces – many of them are more difficult to play than the original. Some have faded into obscurity. Nonetheless, it is a pleasure to have these pieces available again on a concert platform and for tuition purposes. The level of difficulty varies from easy to very quite demanding (Grade 5-10).

Names familiar to the audience include Johann Sebastian Bach, Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach, Johann Christian Bach, Johann Nepomuk Hummel, Franz Liszt, Jean-Louis Tulou, Eugène Walckiers, Théodore Ysaÿe and many others. Some names are less well known here in association with little-known pieces by Johann Sebastian Bach, Johann Christian Bach, Edmund Neumeier or Henry Clay Wysham. The fact that these pieces do not appear in the standard repertoire is an astonishing find; surely they were once popular. It is a pleasure to have these pieces available again on a concert platform and for tuition purposes. The level of difficulty varies from easy to very quite demanding (Grade 5-10).

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We hope you will enjoy this journey of discovery through the Schott archives.

Vorwort

Der Musikverlag Schott, 1770 in Mainz von Bernhard Schott gegründet, feiert 2020 sein 250-jähriges Bestehen. Der Verlag hat dieses Jubiläum unter das Motto „Joy of Music“ gestellt: Zum einen, weil 1826 mit Beethovens 9. Sinfonie eines der bedeutendsten Werke der Musikgeschichte als Erstausgabe bei Schott erschien, mit Schillers berühmtem Schlusschor „Ode an die Freude“ und seinem Text: „alle Menschen werden Brüder“. Zum anderen, weil der Verlag der Überzeugung ist, dass Musik Freude in das Leben jedes einzelnen Menschen bringt und auch das Zusammenleben insgesamt bereichert.

Anlässlich des Jubiläums hat der Verlag Schott zusammen mit seiner Erstausgabe die historische Verlagsarchiv gehoben, die ebenfalls Freude bereitet. „Joy of Music“ wendet sich dieser Sammelband an professionelle Musiker und Liebhaber, die an interessanten Entdeckungen abseits des Standardrepertoires interessiert sind. Er enthält vor allem Werke der Romantik virtuose Zugabe- und Charakterstücke, ausdrucksvolle Charakterstücke sowie kunstvolle Arrangements für Klavier und Konzert. Viele der Originalkompositionen und Bearbeitungen stammen von Komponisten des 19. Jahrhunderts, die Meister ihres Instrumentes waren.

Auch für uns als Herausgeber war „Joy of Music“ ein Abenteuer. In über 250 Jahren hat der Verlag Schott zehntausenden Partituren rund 1700 neue Werke veröffentlicht. Für diesen Jubiläumshand eine repräsentative Auswahl zu treffen, die die Vielfalt der Musik für Flöte und Klavier zu treffen. Neben einigen interessanten Originalen finden sich auch Bearbeitungen aus Oper und Konzert: Fantasien, Variationen, Charakterstücke, Übertragungen – Musik, die vielleicht in Salonklang für ein Kabinettstückchen diente; Musik, die vielleicht in der Kammermusik in Vergessenheit geriet, deren untere Qualität gewahrt wird, um auf dem Podium ebenso wie für Unterrichtszwecke. Der Schwinger ist ein vielseitiges Instrument, das vorwiegend anspruchsvoll (Stufe 3–5).
